Practice makes perfect...

I just heard an amazing statement from one of my voice students, “Well, I practiced this about ten times, and it really feels better.” Incredible!! So, music is more fun to sing, more polished, more accurate, more meaningful, and more confidently presented ... if a person has practiced it! (These young people today are so brilliant.)

OK, I'll stop being a wise guy now, but this student's statement made me laugh out loud (and he even laughed, too, after I pointed out the rather obvious nature of what he had said). Preparation is critical to confidence, and a foundation of anything that results in success. In these next three months, the Minneapolis Commodores have wonderful opportunities to share our music with different audiences, and for many good causes. Our preparation will be the key to the joy that we will be able to share with our listeners, and with each other.

The Commodores have spent many hours, and much money, on procuring good learning tracks to put on *Groupanizer*. It would be a shame, and a waste of these resources, if every member of the Commodores did not take advantage of these valuable tools for music learning. The tracks are so much better than tracks made in years past. (Yes, I contributed to some of those early groaners in bygone days.)

To spend time simply listening to these learning tracks while following along with your music, is not frustrating or drudgery in any way. After a few times through any given song, your confidence level will be significantly improved. Practice, we call it!!

We have shared a simple approach to learning/memorizing music (thank you, **Mark Ortenburger**), and we have provided every learning aid possible to make learning music easier and more enjoyable. The main concept of how to learn/memorize is simply to listen and follow your music, even if you don't think you read music! Listening is more important than trying to sing it if you are not ready. So keep listening to any learning tracks for which you need some help. Don't fret, the songs will become second nature, and will fit comfortably in your voice range after reasonable practice time.

There are choruses that are very demanding about members having music memorized, with tests being given to insure that every singer has done his part with preparation. The Commodores have not taken any steps to make anyone uncomfortable or intimidated, BUT we trust that every singer on the risers for the Minneapolis Commodores has put in the practice-time needed to continue the great musical progress that has been made these past years.

We have 2017 repertoire list in which the selections provide as much or more fun as many of our past favorites. This music is easy to remember and memorize. It was the music of our youth—for many of us!

So, my final words of wisdom (and challenge!) are these: *How would the chorus sound if every singer was as prepared as YOU are?* Think about it, and think about your obligation to the terrific guy singing next to you. Practice makes you feel good! Practice makes you feel prepared! Practice makes you feel confident! Practice makes your singing much more meaningful!

Thank you all for your contributions as singers in the Minneapolis Commodores. We all are obliged to give our very best for each other...every time we make music together.

I love being a Minneapolis Commodore.

Requiem

Bill Sams made his way to the Commodore risers in the 1980s through the early 2000s. Bill was a pleasant, quiet and unassuming man, who, unbeknownst to the vast majority of his Barbershop brothers, had remarkable artistic talents as a renowned "pen and ink" draftsman. His work was sought for innumerable patent applications.

When not Barbershopping, Bill was noted for his prized drawings of Minnesota churches, sketches that enhanced the ecumenical lore of our state. Bill left us in early December.

Warren Krekelberg was a long-time Commodore as a chorus member and as a lead in several chapter quartets. Warren and his brother, Jules (since deceased), were dedicated chapter members as is his son, Dan, who remains a dues-paying, inactive Commodore.

Warren passed away on Christmas day. A memorial service is scheduled for January 13 at 11:00 a.m. at Zion Lutheran Church, 1601 4th Ave., Anoka, with visitation at 10:00 a.m.

Jean Tietze, was a Barbershopper for 71 years, mostly with the Bloomington Chapter, and a treasured friend of many of his Commodore peers. A stroke took him away from the risers decades ago but, for a number of years, he occasionally met with the *Friday Lunch Bunch* (more recently known as *TFLBTMOT*). Jean died on December 19. There will be no funeral.

Georgia Grind

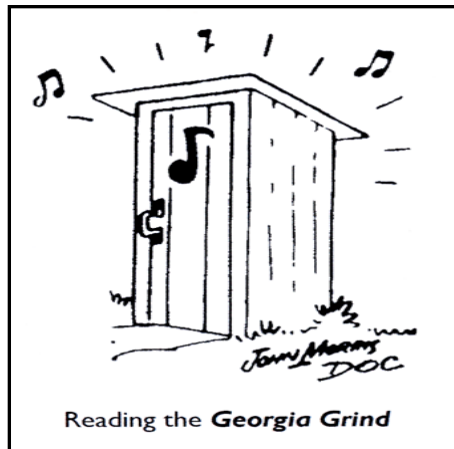
Well, well. The New Year is finally here. In the old year, there was some good ... some really good ... some mediocre ... some bad ... and some really, really bad. Not all years are like that one, but maybe this next one is the time to become better keeping in mind what we experienced. Now as a long-time baritone, I have gained deep insights into the psyche of those unfortunates who are not of the baritone bent. And being the humbly generous person I have become, I am willing to share some aims to contemplate for the next several months.

Thanks go to the *Men's Health* Magazine (December 2016) for an article I came across while waiting for my appointment in a local clinic office (special-needs clinic for the mentally-deranged patients and baritones). The article was entitled something like, and maybe exactly, "Micro-Aggressions to Avoid in 2017." (My scribbled notes were practically illegible as the nurse-bodyguard was insistent that I come with her "right now" for my fitting of a straight jacket. Little do they know that I have watched many offerings on the Internet about how to get out of such a jacket with a modicum of effort. And littler (JEE sic.) did they suspect that I could be able to do so, that is, once I learned to get out of my pants at the end of the day without turning one or both of my pant legs inside out. (But, I digress.)

The article dealt with some things that are just microscopically aggressive actions, but are aggressions nonetheless. And, (at least what that magazine thinks) should be avoided. What in the world is a micro-aggression? Well, let me be the first

to enlighten you. Here is an example for all you vocalists out there.: "Singing out loud that annoyingly-catchy pop song you haven't been able to get out of your head all day." See how that can be ever so tiny an aggression toward others but still with a bit of satisfying, but cleverly veiled, hostility.

Here's another: "Knowing the difference between *your* and *you're* but still mixing them up because you're in a hurry, and anyway, it's just social media." How about: "Texting LOL when you barely cracked a smile." Or finally from my personal experience, "Calling your cell mate, *Tiny* even though he weighs 350 pounds and bends iron bars for fun."

Got the idea? Now to make these up, you have to think small in a very large way. Try ruminating over that pet peeve (small one, mind you) that hooks you every time and then put together a micro-aggressive statement reflecting it. Oh, this becomes so enticing that you may want to actually relish and expound upon it rather than avoiding it in 2017. But I have no control over what you decide to do. Just realize that once you release that tiger, the whole jungle is at risk! Not my fault...

But, let me arm you a bit anyway. Since this is a Barbershop publication, I'll limit it to Barbershoppy kinds of things. Here's one: "Telling a lead that he is a great quarteter even though he can never remember the first words to a song, needs to have the pitch match his first note,

and then sings flat anyway." See where we are going with this? Another: "Smilingly telling a baritone to his face that you and others really love the sound of the hodge-podge of notes he has to sing and then changing to a smirk as you slowly turn away." Or: "Humming along with a bass as he sings his lowest notes and then telling him that you, too, can sing that low and lower, but you prefer to sing tenor." Completing the Barbershop parts: "Pretending to intentionally listen to a tenor screeching in his struggle to reach the right pitch while you are casually stuffing Oreo cookie filling into your ears."

Hey, let's get the directors in on this. Remember, micro-aggressions only... "Looking straight at the director to his great appreciation of your attention while actually you are concentrating on that cute, short-skirted blonde in the third row." (Requires pretty good peripheral vision) Oh, let's get another baritone MA: "Being a contrary baritone, you intentionally sing loudly even though your part is higher than the leads." 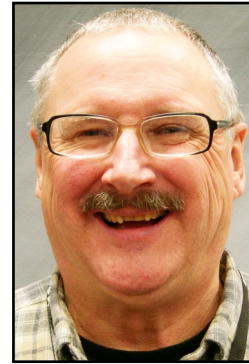

Sponsored by TFLBTMOT, its altruistic purpose is to raise funds for the *Youth in Harmony* arm of the Society's *Harmony Foundation*, specifically for the **Jim Richards Memorial Matching-Funds Challenge**. As a means of honoring our dear departed friend, Jim Richards, the idea was conceived and proposed to TFLBTMOT by **Jim Clark**, Foundation Re-

gional Director and lead of **Storm Front**, the 2010 International Quartet Champions.

The group jumped at the chance and pledged \$50,000 for this project over the next five years challenging the LOL District community to match that number. (Since its inception at the LOL District Convention, the project has garnered more than \$21,000 in matching funds.)

Historically, TFLBTMOT has raised close to \$6,000 yearly (\$10,000 in 2016) for support of youth-chorus competitions at the Society's Mid-winter Conventions. Last January nearly 500 young men crossed the contest stage at the Reno Midwinter, all their lodging expenses taken care of by the Foundation.

This year we want to fill this scramble-tournament with 36 men's, women's, and mixed foursomes. As

an added incentive *Storm Front* will be participating in the tournament and will provide a "19th Hole Performance" at the Golf Club. We are also looking for "Hole Sponsors." Sponsorships may be purchased on line at **bhsopen.com** at a minimum of \$100. These donations are tax deductible (*and this is a totally non-profit event*). 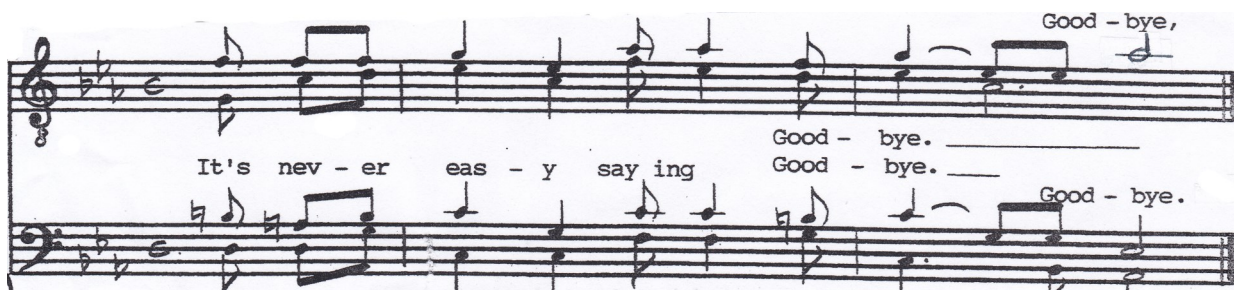

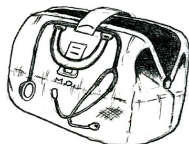
