Cathy and I just returned from our first Midwinter Convention and I'm at the point where I'm about to exhaust all the superlatives I know. It was an amazing weekend full of old friends, new friends and a number of gold-medal moments. A few very special ones came from the opening concert on Thursday night with its extraordinary line-up. A standout memory for me came from **Signature**, 2016 fourth-place International medalists singing their show stopping *Change is Gonna Come*, which might just be the best, most moving thing I've ever heard. There was also **Tim Waurick** "filling-in" for **Joe Connelly** (who wasn't there because he was actually flooded in) in **Keepsake**. Tim didn't miss a beat and proved why he's a very special talent, but we all knew that already. Along with **Forefront**, **Four Voices**, **Main Street**, and many others, the convention was certainly off and running.

My other standout memory came from an opportunity I had to participate in the 200-man *All-District Chorus*. We learned three great songs before heading to San Antonio where we rehearsed on Thursday and Friday night (10 p. m.-midnight) and again before leading off the Saturday night show. This was a really neat experience from so

many different perspectives. **Donny Rose**, current head of *Harmony University*, among about a thousand other things he does, was our director. Over the course of the two nighttime rehearsals we were coached by: *Forefront*,

Pratt Street Power, and *Main Street's Tony DeRosa*. All these guys were wonderful coaches and if you ever have a chance to get some coaching from Tony, don't miss the opportunity. Don't let your friends miss this show.

Bill Ward cherished those moments, especially quartetting, when he con-

All-District Chorus Director, **Donny Rose**. He mentioned that one of the things that drives him crazy is seeing clinicians settle for OK ("That was nice.") from a senior group but demanding a much higher performance level from a younger group. The result, quite predictably, is that each group lives up to the expectations that have been set. Donny's goal for us was to sing at a very high level even though we had never sung together before.

Did we remember everything we'd been taught? No, but I'm sure we did a lot better because he helped us believe what we could be if we chose to. The same lesson applies in

our own chapter where our directors work very hard to set high expectations. It's ultimately up to each one of us to choose to sing better. (It's a whole lot more fun that way!)

I had a couple of additional gold-medal moments that came Saturday. I was waiting for our final chorus rehearsal to start when I heard some singing, which of course I had to investigate. I followed the sound to a room (the doors were open) and found **Signature** and **Forefront** rehearsing *Kiss From a Rose*, the song they were going to sing that evening. Certainly the best private concert I ever had.

And finally, there was one of the focal points for the event, the *Youth*

part of the convention. The 700 kids, singing in boys, girls, and mixed ensembles throughout the event, joined together in a combined chorus. Since everyone couldn't fit on the stage, a large number were arrayed down each of the aisles in the theater.

We, in the audience, were treated to lively four-wall-surround-sound from a chorus of enthusiastic voices. It was hard to tell who was having a better time, the audience or the kids. I do know that there is a group of 700 young people whose lives were changed forever over that special weekend and who will be returning home to spread the gospel of ever-harmonious Barbershop. Me too! (*Costa Mesa in Jan. 2018, anyone?*)

tests! We have SO many great memories of our time in San Antonio! They started with our early arrival on the Sunday of convention week so that we could spend time walking down "Memory Lane" as we visited our old neighborhood and ate at our favorite Tex-Mex Restaurant, *Martha's*, located near the home my folks had in northwest San Antonio.

One of my best memories of our time in San Antonio was singing with *The Chordsmen* Barbershop Chorus, directed by my old friend and golf partner, **Artie Dolt**. Artie now has a new chorus called *Friends in Harmony* that he, and 19 friends, founded in September 2014. Having *Fun* was their #1 goal and each new member was assured of sharing the true *Barbershop Experience*. In a little over two years, the chorus has grown to 130 members, the majority of whom are new to Barbershopping. Having attended two of their recent meetings, I can attest that they do have fun and they do sing quite well. Be sure to visit *Friends* if you ever have the opportunity

On Tuesday, we rendezvoused with Randy and Stephanie Klopffleisch. Randy is an expatriate Commodore now living in California. We spent the day driving up to the German settlement of Fredericksburg (about 70 miles northwest of San Antonio in the Texas Hill Country where we enjoyed fine German cuisine (and beer). We

had to forego visits to the *Chester Nimitz Museum* and the *George H.W. Bush Museum of the Pacific War*.

Leaving Fredericksburg, we drove to the nearby *LBJ Ranch*. The Visitor Center was closed, but we were able to get close enough to the Ranch to see the house, out-buildings and the cemetery where LBJ is buried. It is a truly beautiful place.

On Wednesday the Convention got into high gear with the Keynote Address by **Deke Sharon**, the *Godfather of Contemporary A Cappella*, who, when he's not producing the *Pitch Perfect* movies or *The Sing Off*, spends a lot of time promoting and supporting Barbershopping! His presentation was terrific, motivating everyone in the room and furnishing a perfect start to what was to become a fantastic convention experience!

The *Thursday Night Show* opened with the Association of Senior Quartet Champions Chorus (including our own Bob Griffith) along with a performance by the 2016 Senior Champions, *High Priority*. The Chorus was directed by **Joe Liles**. I knew Joe from my first visit to the San Antonio *Chordsmen* as a high-school senior in 1970 when Joe was their director. He went on to serve the Society as Director of Musical Services and Society CEO becoming known and loved by all in the Land O'Lakes District. He and **Jim Richards** were the closest of friends for decades.

Then came the quartets and, oh my, did we get entertained, starting with LOL District's own *Vintage Mix* (the quadruplets from Milwaukee) and *Boardwalk* (terrific entertainers who would make great headliners for the Commodores). A highlight for me was *Pratt Street Power*, the current 2016 Int'l Youth Quartet Champions, destined for greater achievements. The same applies to *Signature*, the 2014 Int'l fourth-place Medalist Quartet.

Then came a parade of past champi-

ons, *Four Voices*, *Keepsake*, and the 2016 gold-medalists, *Forefront*. It was very special to hear *The Buzz*, the 2005 Sweet Adeline Queens of Harmony. Holding their own with this august company was *Main Street*, 2016 third-place Int'l Medalists and the headline quartet for the Commodores annual show on April 1. Capping the evening was the heartwarming performance by *The Children's Chorus of San Antonio*, a fitting end to a wonderful evening.

Friday was our "Long Day" but not as long as that for **Paul Wigley** and his fellow judges as they adjudicated the 25 Choruses that competed in the *Youth and Senior Chorus Festival*. This year, the Society added a new twist to the competition by adding five Seniors Choruses representing five Districts. I liked the idea but I think it detracts from the Youth Festival and would be better served as a separate Senior Chorus Festival. We need to be letting those kids remain in the spotlight without having to share it with seniors. This marathon contest, in two sessions, started at 11 a.m. and even with getting done early, didn't finish until 9 p.m. That is a LONG DAY, especially for the judges!

Saturday was a really fun day as 24 Senior quartets took to the stage. The highlight was cheering on the incomparable *St. Croix Crossing*, who had finished second in the last two Seniors contests. Everyone in our "group" had their fingers crossed but when the medalist spots were announced, our boys placed third, **seven points out of First Place!** (The top four spots were separated by only 11 points.). This was by far the closest contest I have ever seen! We all thought SCX had it this year; they sang beautifully, but it just wasn't meant to be.

The Grand Finale was the Saturday Night Show that, emphasizing *YOUTH*, opened with *The Ladies*, the current Sweet Adeline Rising Star Champions. Following were reprises of several of the groups that had per-

formed on the Thursday Night Show including *Main Street* (Again, incredibly entertaining!).

Forefront collaborating with *Signature* performed an eight-part rendition of *Kiss From a Rose*, not traditional Barbershop, but none-the-less one of the highlights of the evening. The *Audience Favorites* from Thursday's Youth Chorus Contest, *The Treble Makers*, a high-school-girls chorus from Chandler, Arizona, performed and again thrilled the audience. The young ladies performed flawlessly on both occasions with a student direc-

tor, their mentor and director, **Lori Lyford**, being detained at home for a serious family emergency.

The ultimate HIGHLIGHT OF THE ENTIRE CONVENTION was the final Convention event as those of us in the audience were surrounded by 600 young singers (400 boys and 200 girls) as they sang to us. I get goosebumps just thinking about that experience. These kids are our future and they will do us proud.

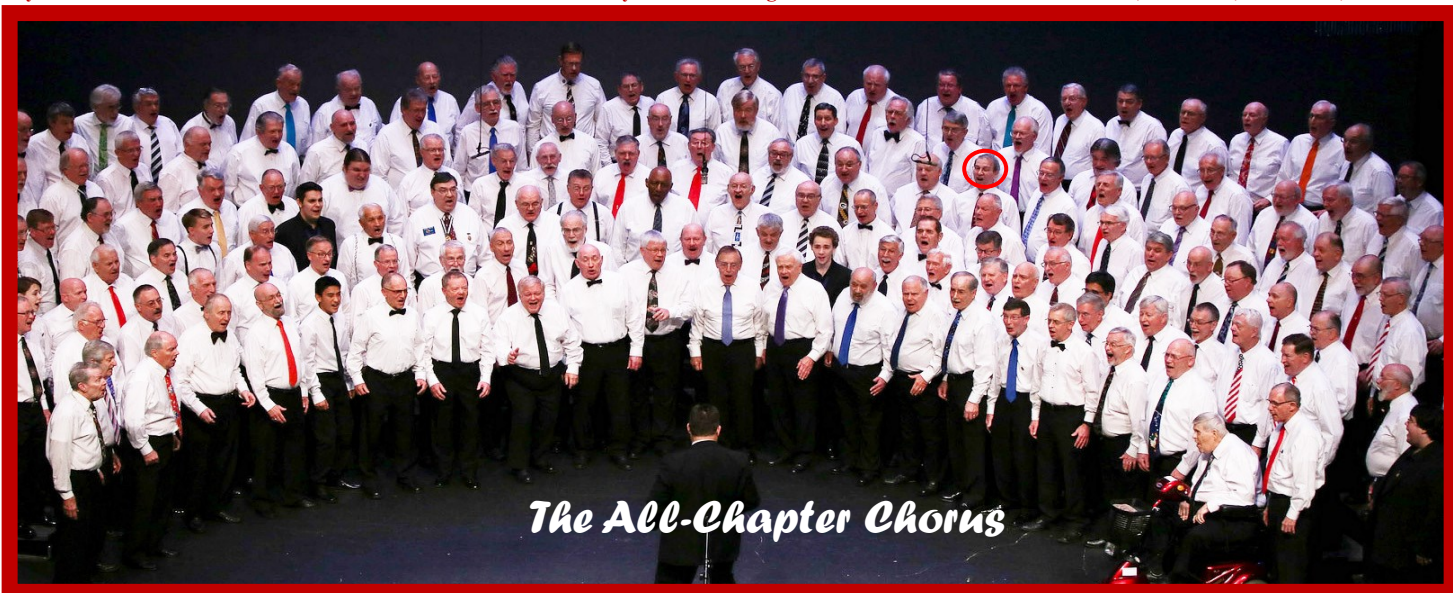
In closing, while all the activities we participated in were tons of fun, the very best part of our time in San Antonio was being able to spend time

... one Commodore about whom it is fair to say that our Tuesday evening attendance would be a lot smaller if all we had to look forward to was the music. Not that having a chance to sing with others isn't a pretty powerful draw all by itself, but we know that the camaraderie that exists in our chapter is a pretty powerful part of what keeps many of us coming back. Part of that camaraderie comes from the willingness of so many to make contributions of their time and expertise whenever the need arises.

With those thoughts in mind I would like to focus on one of our very own remarkable Commodores, **Dick Riemenschneider**, who, along with his wonderful wife, Marge, is responsible for the fact that we show up on a specific Tuesday night in November and find our orders of almonds, pistachios, cashews, and trail mix, all neatly bagged and ready to distribute to our customers. Their time-contributions every year are easily in the hundreds of hours.

A behind-the-scenes look would suggest that this is not just a process that consumes a few weeks during the November packing and distribution season ("Crunch Time"). Dick puts in many, many hours long before November ever rolls around.

All the supplies have to be procured. Labels have to be designed, printed, and applied to the bags. Dick has to coordinate closely with our supplier to understand pricing that changes year to year to figure out how we need to modify our own prices. Or-

ders have to be entered and processed to keep track of every detail.

As the season approaches, Dick and Marge basically turn their home into a full-blown bagging and storage operation. It's only partially true that when Dick and Marge moved 18 months ago they did so with consideration for a house that would support the needs for handling the Commodore Nut Operation.

Dick must handle each case of nuts multiple times (unloading the truck, stacking and storing, bringing them to the packing operation, taking the full cases back to storage, packing individual orders, loading the car to bring to HOP, unloading the car and sorting by individual buyer, etc.) And if the whole physical procurement, packaging, and distribution weren't enough, he also serves as Chief Marketing Officer to keep encouraging us to sell as many nuts as possible. Dick also uses the "off-season" to think about, and then implement, ways of improving the process to enhance operational efficiency and quality of the final product (special foil bags, heat sealing, custom bags, etc.).

Lest you think this is the only contribution Dick makes to the chapter, recognize that he also has been coordinating the Ladies Night/ BOTY celebrations (even bringing his whole family to pitch in when the situation called for it a few years ago) and any number of other "whatever needs to be done" things. In his spare time, when he's not golfing, he also sings with *Easy Listenin'*, the *Sounds of Renown*, and the *Harmony Brigade*.

The next time you see him, make sure to express your own gratitude for everything he does. It would also be nice to send Marge a note of thanks as well. The two of them exemplify what being a part of the Commodore family is all about. If you need an example of people who go way above and beyond the call of duty, look no further. We are all much the richer for their generosity.

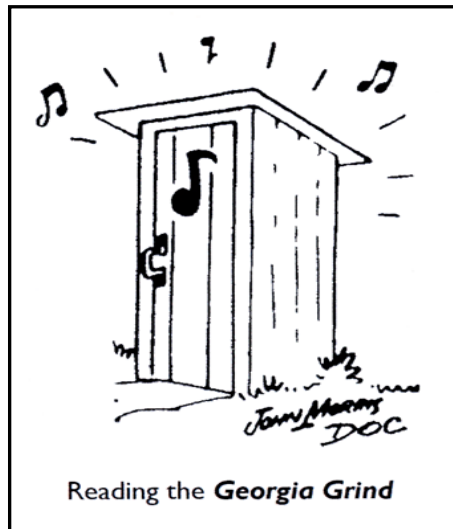

master. And those are expensive if you want a finely-made baster. But I

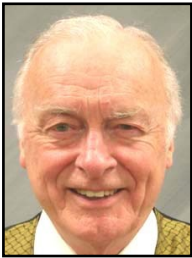

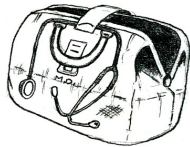
