



Across the Pond with Paul and Sarah Wigley

Our trip of a lifetime in Wales



The Llangollen International Musical Eisteddfod began in 1947, and was organized in a spirit of hope and idealism to repair the terrible conflicts of World War II. A story was told about the first (1947) Master of Ceremonies, a Welshman, who was introducing a children's choir from Germany. He simply said, "And now, our friends from Germany"...and the crowd gave them a rousing standing ovation. Can there be a stronger statement about the healing power of music? That is still the spirit of the International Musical Eisteddfod.

My (and Sarah's) journey to Wales began only two days after Becky and I had returned from the International Barbershop Convention in Pittsburgh, where I had been judging quartets and choruses for four straight days. Sarah and I landed in London, immediately took the train to Chester, and were met by our driver, who then took us to Llangollen, Wales. Llangollen is an amazing village that could be lifted right from any movie set that needed a small European village for a backdrop. It was stunningly beautiful, and we had wonderful weather to make it even more magical.

One feature of the Llangollen festival is a concert featuring a world-class musician every evening. The evening before we arrived, Burt Bacharach was the headliner. The evening we arrived, the headliner was a harpist that recently was the *Royal Harpist*. It also happens that the harpist, **Catrin Finch**, is the daughter-in-law of our Welsh rela-

Having the chance to take this once-in-a-lifetime trip with Dad was extraordinary on so many levels. Being that we are both musicians, clinicians, and educators, we had the opportunity to enjoy music from all over the world together while making friends with amazing people from France, Turkey, the



Netherlands, and Malaysia. Both Dad and I have always agreed that music is the true universal language, but being at the Eisteddfad could not have made this statement more true.

Being a Wigley, there is an additional magical element of spending time together in our family's homeland of Wales and enjoying time with relatives who open our eyes to all of the reasons we are proud to be Welsh! I am very grateful to say I will be returning to Llangollen next year to judge the Eisteddfad while Dad is judging International in Nashville.

tives! So we had a great time re-connecting with Catrin and our relatives. And, her concert was incredible. (Check out Catrin Finch on YouTube sometime she is amazing.)

The very next day I was off and running on my judging duties. My first competition was to judge the Vocal Ensemble category. This segment featured choirs from Wales, Singapore, and California. The scoring format is interesting, basically a narrow range of scores that are actually used (because you don't want to hurt anyone's feelings!), from about 70-95. The judges write comments

that the competitors will be able to read afterward (so I had to try and write neatly...not an easy task!). Then the judges confer and rank the contestants, eventually rewarding 1st, 2nd, 3rd places. But the contest is not anywhere near as exhausting as judg-

ing our International Barbershop contest, so that was great for me!

That evening we met a group of judges from all over the world, and had dinner in a great little Welsh pub. To make it even better, a dance judge from Turkey picked up the tab for Sarah and me! He became a great friend! (I did get a chance to repay the favor.)

The next day I was judging men's choruses (not Barbershop). were all very strong, and sang gleeclub style music. There was no choreography, but their involvement and passion for singing was truly evident, and it was wonderful to be a part of that contest. That evening, the headline performer was a pop star from North America, Rufus Wainwright. While we were not totally familiar with his music, I did know he was a very creative composer and performer. Sarah and I were offered complimentary seats in the judges' seating area that we happily accepted for his thoroughly enjoyable concert. He was a fantastic performer, and a very interesting composer in many genres. What was fun was after the concert, we were just getting our things backstage, and what was the first thing I saw was Rufus Wainwright kissing my daughter on the cheek! (It's that European thing, I guess.) We also knew that he was staying at our hotel, so we got to know each other at a little party later that night, and also chatted again the next morning as Rufus and his band were leaving.

A small world story: He was asking me where I was from, and I said Minneapolis, and then he said that he was working on a collaboration with a choir from Minneapolis. I knew immediately that it was probably VocalEssence, and I asked him if he was working with Phillip Brunelle, and of course, he was. Another small world story is that Lucy Wainwright, his sister, also performed in

Our last day in Llangollen was Barbershop-chorus-judging day. The only slight disappointment was that there were no men's Barbershop groups, only women's Barbershop groups. They were all very well-prepared, though, and did a great job of understanding what good Barbershop singing is all about. I was the 'lead judge' for that competition,

which meant that I gave verbal evaluations of every group...to the entire audience! Interesting, and a little nerve-wracking!

The final evening was the official *Choir of the World* competition, where all the 1st place winners of each choral category competed again,

for the overall championship. It was fantastic to see choirs from Jamaica, Ireland, Wales, Singapore, and England all singing their hearts out! The ultimate winners were from Ireland, and the auditorium went nuts when they were announced.

I was so blessed to be able to judge a music contest with judges

from England (one of whom had Prince William and Prince Harry as students!), France, Spain, Norway, Wales, Netherlands, Indonesia (Sarah became very good friends with her), and Poland. I was the only judge from the USA. That was quite humbling. What was so amazing was the realization that at breakfast on Thursday morning, we were all meeting each other for the very first time of our lives...and that by Saturday night, we were toasting each other at 2 a. m., realizing that music had made us worldwide friends for life. Hugs, smiles, toasts, exchanges of email addresses, and good wishes were the highlight of our last night at the International Eisteddfod. The spirit of the world coming together through music was as strong as ever.

It was the opportunity of a lifetime, and this couplet by the Welsh poet, T. Gwynn Jones, sums it up: "Blessed is a world that sings, Gentle are its songs." If only the entire world would truly embrace this credo...


We all need to embrace our wonderful opportunity to sing together every Tuesday night and be part of our blessed world that sings.

The chairs and tables are no longer in place when the members arrive for chapter meetings. The seemingly endless supply of break-time cookies and sweets has abated and the gentle provider, our Sergeant-at-arms/Attendance-taker, who provided them, has left us, after 67 years as a Commodore, to join the Celestial Chorus.

Yes, our beloved **Loren Berthilson**, after seeming to recover miraculously from what too often is a fatal infection and returning home for follow-up rehab, passed away on the late afternoon of August 3. A visiting nurse was taking him for a short walk when she saw he didn't look well. She asked, "Are you all right?" In reply Loren said, "No" and then quietly answered the Lord's call.

Loren was born on January 22, 1924, and married the love of his life, Jane, on May 26, 1951. They have three surviving daughters but tragically

lost a son, Daniel, in a motorcycle accident years ago.

It can be said that except for illness and occasional vacations Loren never missed a chapter meeting since becoming a Commodore in 1948. He stepped off the risers in the early 70s but continued attending chapter meetings assuming the role of venue-manager and Sergeant-at-arms.

Your Editor had the privilege of introducing Loren as the 1982 Barbershopper of the Year that spring, to the assembled Barbershoppers, wives and friends at Jax Café. Following his selection as the 1982 BOTY Loren became the custodian of the BOTY ribbon box, delivering it faithfully each year to the award venue. However his last illness prevented his attendance at this year's celebration this past June. He and his sweetheart, Jane, were sorely missed.

The Passing of a Great Barbershopper By Bryan Lynch

The Barbershop Harmony Society celebrates the life and legacy of Gene Cokeroft, a genial giant of our musical art form and culture. His towering achievements in any of a number of areas would qualify him as "unforgettable" but to have mastered and given so much, to the development and growth of Barbershop harmony, makes him a true legend.

Most Barbershoppers would recognize Gene primarily as the tenor of 1961 International Quartet Champion The Suntones, a landmark, trendsetting quartet whose musical innovations and wide-ranging public appearances brought the style to millions of listeners.

A prolific arranger and composer, Gene is credited with dozens of charts in our library, including definitive versions still sung today, and with his wife Iris, composed the stalwart show favorite "They Wrote 'Em In The Good Old Days." A committed chapter chorus director, Gene helmed the Miamians Chorus



for more than 40 years.

In the past decade, Gene has devoted himself to bringing barbershop to a new generation of singers, as a key player in the outreach movement. He formed, directed and took the Young Miamians to the International Youth Chorus Festival in 2009, a group which proved a hotbed of young talent.

For these, and many other unsung moments of mentorship and joy, Gene Cokeroft earned the distinction as the only man to TWICE be inducted into the Barbershop Harmony Society's Hall of Fame: first in 2005, as part of The Suntones, and again in 2009, as an individual of immense merit.

shows! **Como** is always a fun experience, and Maple Grove was a great venue with a very








All the Barbershop world is mourning the recent loss of Gene Cockeroft, tenor of the Hall of Fame 1961 International Quartet Champion *Suntones*. Gene was an incredible talent who freely and humbly shared his musical gifts with everyone. The Suntones repertoire, considered a bit modern by some, was simply continuing the tradition of our founders who sang the popular songs of the day in the Barbershop style. Gene was a pioneer in the effort to share Barbershop with the youth of his home *Sunshine District* and influenced many who are now sharing what they have learned with their own generations. I was honored to have had Gene in my *Physics of Sound* class at Harmony College and treasure the experience of exploring some of the properties of his incredible tenor voice. At the most recent Harmony University at Belmont University in Nashville, the entire student body and faculty learned one of Gene's tags and sang it to his widow, Iris, via Skype during the day of his funeral.
