have a demo record which I loved to play. However, I was the only one in my family who wanted to hear it more than once. The record was made at a high performance car race. The recording included the sounds of Lamborghinis, Ferraris, and Maseratis. I was fascinated by the sounds of these cars and would sit in front of the stereo appearing as if I was watching the cars race around the track, my head moving back and forth like I was watching a tennis match. Each lap around the track was somewhat like the measures in the music we sing. On the straight lanes of the race track the sound would start softly and would continue to a roar until the turn when it would settle back to low purring sound.

Regardless of where the Ferrari was on the track, you could feel and hear the energy from its huge 500 horse-power engine. The driver was always in control of this magnificent machine with a nimble grip on the steering wheel and by applying just the right pressure on the accelerator pedal he obtained maximum acceleration

wherever the car was on the race track. The driver was dependent on the high and unfaltering performance of each engine component. If a spark plug didn't fire or a fuel filter clogged, the race would be lost.

ANNUAL NUT SALES KICK-OFF

Here it is Labor Day again and for the

Commodore Members that means the Annual Nut Sales are starting up. For new members the Annual Nut Sales are a revenue-generating program that allows every Commodore to help contribute to our treasury.

The premise is simple. Members take orders for one-pound bags of nuts to be delivered at a later date. When orders are complete the appropriate amount of bulk nuts are ordered and the bulk nuts are broken down into one-pound bags. The nuts are then distributed to the member salesman to deliver to the customers. Since this is a "wholesale product in/retail product out" operation the Commodores take the profits on the sales.

The Commodores have been doing an annual nut sales drive as a fund-raiser for many years (I have some old Nut Order Forms that date to 1983, and I don't know if there was a Nut Sales Drive prior to that). Over those many years the nut sales effort has contributed significantly to the Commodores treasury. During my tenure as Nut Administrator, which dates to 2006, the Nut Sales Drive has contributed a total of \$109,100 to the Commodores treasury (an average of \$9,918 per year).

With the potential of that kind of cash enhancement to the Commodores' treasury, every member should be working at selling these nuts. For those new to the program, these are top quality nuts from a Minnesota supplier. Usually they are less than two weeks from the roaster to the customer, a claim that the top-tier grocery and specialty stores cannot match. Our customers rave about the quality of our product, and our prices are at least competitive with the fancy stores (and in fact, are lower on some items). Our customers are friends and

relatives of Commodores members. Our members sell to neighbors, work mates, spouse work mates, or friends from their church. I've heard of orders from members' banks, dentist office, barbershop, car mechanic, or insurance office. A lot of these orders get bigger every year because these nuts are so delicious.

Just like last year the nuts will be in heavy-duty, heat-sealed plastic bags with professional looking labels. We also offer foil gift bags with the Commodores information on the back and a greeting label on the front complete with a "From" and "To" for gift giving. The additional cost for the foil bag is \$1.50.

Unlike last year when we had some significant price increases, the prices of four of our products have stayed the same as last year and prices of six products have actually decreased. Five products have decreased in price by \$0.50 and one product by \$1.00. As you contact your potential customers you can point out the price decreases.

We also have a relationship with several businesses that order a quantity of nuts in the foil bag as a holiday favor to their vendors or their employees. For business customers we offer custom labels on the front side of the bag with the business name and logo to promote their business. If you think a business you deal with might like to give away our product as a favor for their vendors or customers, please promote this to them. The additional cost is still only \$1.50 for the foil bag.

How does the sale of nuts break down within the chorus you ask? Last year 67 Commodores sold nuts and 2,525 pounds of product were delivered. JOHN CARLOTTO was the top salesperson selling 190 pounds, DAN COLE, second, with 135 pounds, and CARL PINARD and DENNY ROLLOFF tied for third with 124 pounds each. Within the chorus the average product delivered was 37.4 pounds per member selling. The median product delivered was 22 per member selling. If you feel you cannot sell that amount, do not despair. Thirtyseven members sold fewer than 25

pounds. Any amount you sell to others, or buy yourself, contributes to our fund raising. These nuts freeze very well and we've been munching on them in our house throughout the summer. Also, everyone in our family really likes the Dried Apples and finds them to be a real special treat.

You can begin selling immediately and be sure to collect the money when the order is taken. No nuts are stockpiled and only the nuts paid for are ordered. Our vendor makes only one delivery and we receive an extra 2% discount for payment within 10 days of delivery. Thus, it is essential to collect the money when making the sale.

Forms are in this issue of THE CHORDINATOR and are also distributed at chorus meetings. For help with the selling process, talk to most any Commodore and they will be willing to show you the ropes.

Most of our customers look forward to our nut sales every year. They like the very high quality of the product we sell and, of course, many like to support the Commodores. The deadline for Thanksgiving delivery is at the meeting on Tuesday, October 25. Please start selling immediately.

sic, I would venture that for most of you, music has followed you all your life. It may have been dormant for some time with kids, jobs, and all the other things that need attention at one time or an-


other. But each time you tapped your toe or nodded your head to the beat of your favorite music, the music in your soul was beckoning to you to blossom in some more evident way. As a Barbershopper, you are privileged to have given in to that beckoning whether it was at an early age or later on in life. Music adds a whole 'nother dimension to everything you do. And you become a much more interesting person. You might even become almost as handsome as a baritone if you sing, but I can't make that bold a promise to you.

For me, I remember mostly the different types of music that were available to me and to which I took advantage in a small Minnesota town of about 4,000. You could join just about any group there as they always appreciated one more person. On top of singing in a great high school chorus under a very talented director, you could also play in a tremendous high school band under a very talented band director. Of course you could sing in the church choir and many of us did. And then in the summers, you played in the Community Band directed by the local music-store owner. Quite a conglomeration of backgrounds in that band!

Every Thursday summer evening, the Community Band members would climb the stairs up to the second story of the old-fashioned, gingerbread-architectured "cupola" bandstand surrounded by streets, trees in the adjoining park, and parking areas. We wore white shirts with black ties and as we warmed up, cars would start to gather. Every place they could park was eventually taken and sometimes the

best they could do was get out of their cars a block away and walk over ... or just cruise slowly by as we played. The tradition was that at the end of each song, every car would honk its horn many times in appreciation. Recalling that still gives me shivers. The *Light Cavalry Overture* was a special audience favorite.

I won't go on about later years and I don't want you to think that I am dissatisfied about how much music I have experienced, But. But.... A bunch more certainly would have been welcomed. Maybe that's why I harp (No pun intended—or was it?) on making your music bucket list. And then acting on it.



What does music do for you? You, individually, I mean. Last weekend my wife, Mary, and I were at a Farmer's Market in Phoenix Park, Eau Claire, Wisconsin, an outstanding newer facility on the Chippewa River next to downtown. People from all walks of life (pretty trite, eh?) come there on Saturdays to listen to a music group or two set up in the gazebo, buy gorgeous flower arrangements, fill their bags with delicious looking produce, sample the breads and on and on.
