



Pitch Pipe Perfect Gets Praise... and an Encore Performance!

April blizzard could stop the Minneapolis Commodores' 2018 annual show, *Pitch Pipe Perfect*, from being a smashing success. The small but enthusiastic audience was effusive in their praise of the

Guest quartet *Instant Classic* braved the weather to travel from Indiana to deliver an outstanding performance. Moreover they obviously enjoyed their cameos as guest judges in the competition and in the finale, when they shared the stage with the Commodores for a show-stopping performance of *This Could Be The Start of Something Big*.

Many more than a few audience members said *Pitch Pipe Perfect* was among the best Commodore shows they had ever seen. The only downside was that so many patrons were homebound because of the miserable weather/driving conditions

However, every snow cloud has a silver lining, and I am thrilled to report that Commodores will be giving a reprise performance of *Pitch* Pipe Perfect on Saturday, June 2! In our show, the two competing choruses were offered lifelines, called "Encores," that allowed each chorus to sing one extra song in any one round of the competition as an extra chance to win that round. This time, it was Bethel University that threw the Commodores a lifeline by making us an extremely generous offer allowing us to present an unprecedented encore performance of our annual show on Saturday June 7th at 7:00 p.m. at Bethel's Benson Great Hall. All ticket holders who were unable to attend the April performance will be able to attend the encore performance at no additional cost. Patrons who still have their tickets in their possession should bring them to Bethel on the day of the show. Those who were planning to pick their tickets up at will call will be able to do just that. Any members or patrons who no longer have their tickets need not worry, as we will have, at Bethel, on show evening, a master list of ticket buyers. You will just need to check in and get your tickets.

For those who do not already have tickets, additional tickets will be for sale through Bethel's website: tickets.bethel.edu. A link to that website will also be available on the Minneapolis Commodores' website. All additional tickets will cost \$20 and will also be available at the door.

It is important to note that due to the unique logistics of this second show, there will be no reserved seating for either existing ticket holders or new ticket buyers. However, there are plenty of good seats on the main floor as well as in the balcony to accommodate the expected crowd.

As of writing this article, we have not yet confirmed a guest quartet for this second performance. We are in talks with several highly acclaimed quartets and hope to make a formal announcement in the near future.

The Commodores hope you will take advantage of this unique opportunity and join us at 7:00 p.m. on Saturday, June 2, at Bethel for the special encore performance of Pitch Pipe Perfect. We are absolutely thrilled that not even an April blizzard was be able to stop us from sharing our annual show with all of our patrons. We are also extremely grateful to Bethel, and in particular to Kerri Baker and his tech crew for their generosity and all of their hard work on our behalf.

We look forward to seeing you at the encore performance in June!





The group now known as *The Friday* Lunch Bunch that Meets on Thursday was organized in the early-to-mid 1960s as a means of sharing information about Barbershop activities in the various chapters in the Twin Cities area. It was largely the brain child of Olaf Lee and Ed Peterka, with help from Bruce Churchill, stalwarts in the Minneapolis Chapter.

At that time area chapters included Minneapolis, St. Paul, Minnetonka, St. Croix Valley, Bloomington, and Roseville (assuming we organized before that chapter merged with St. Paul in 1965). Later participants were the Anoka County Chapter which chartered in 1984 and the Hilltop Chapter which chartered in 1986. The luncheon group has met consistently once every week (except for holidays) for approximately 53 years and is still going strong.

I am the only current attendee who has been involved from the very be-

ginning. I'm not sure how accurate my memories are, but I'll do my best to provide a bit of history. Our first meeting place was the Elks Club then located on Fifth St. in downtown Minneapolis. Over the years we changed meeting places many times. The ones I remember included the afore-mentioned Elks Club, the Fair Oaks Hotel (or some such place on the outer edges of downtown Minneapolis), the Nankin Restaurant in downtown Minneapolis, the Twin Motor Inn at University and Prior in St. Paul, the Moose Lodge in Northeast Minneapolis, another restaurant near the Moose Lodge whose name escapes me, the restaurant on E. Hennepin which is now named the Conga Latin Bistro, Elsie's Restaurant and Bowling Alleys in northeast Minneapolis, the Legends Café on E. Hennepin, and



for the past many years the Moose on Monroe.

The structure of our meetings has changed little over the years. Early birds have always enjoyed a cocktail or two and a lot of quartet singing before it's time for lunch and the formal meeting. The meeting begins with a bit of humor provided by our most recent leader, Dan Cole, followed by learning and singing a tag

(a legacy of the late great Dr. Jim Richards), reports from chapter representatives in attendance, and gang-singing of an old chestnut or two or three or four.

We also register weekly, each member throwing fifty cents into the suitably-engraved and logoed Ed Peterka Memorial Cylinder, hoping that his name will be drawn the following week to win 80% of the accumulated fortune, the remainder going to the Harmony Foundation of the Barbershop Harmony Society. If your name is drawn and you are not in attendance, whatever you would have won is carried over to the next meeting. That little ploy to encourage regular attendance has been going on since we started meeting those 50-some years ago. years ago.

One major change in recent years has been the practice of making monetary contributions either to hear a report from the Minneapolis Chapter or to prevent the report from being given. This entertaining bit of tomfoolery began some years back when the late Minneapolis Commodore, Joe Houser, typically presented the Minneapolis Chapter report and, in the view of some, may have gotten a little long-winded in so doing. The practice continues today when it is usually Dan Cole's silence or verbosity which is purchased. This bidding is done all in fun and has proven to be a tremendous fund-raiser. And don't worry, Commodores. The cagey Dan Cole gets your message across one way or another no matter what the results of the bidding.

We've found that the move has resulted in more regular attendance because we don't lose members to Friday trips to the lake or other weekend destinations. Somebody
