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

This tag was built spur-of-the-moment as one of the first tags with which I started experimenting in college, thinking that a scissors maneuver would make so much sense. I made this evident in the bass and baritone parts; bass starts higher than the baritone (note stems up vs. down) and the 2 parts proceed mirror-image to 'Day' where tenor and bass hang for the lead-baritone duet. Tenor has the melody. The tag is much like the tag of a Holiday Bells medley tune I currently practice with the Minnesota Chorale, part of their Holiday Heralds program, but the differences are F7 instead of F chords in the first measure, no C chords, scissors, inverted Bb ending chord, and the add-in 'Christmas Day' at the very end. Perfect as an opener into the holiday season!

despaired of never having the Chord-Inator, or some semblance thereof, exist in our futures. From my experience, it takes a special and gifted person



Here is a list of things you can do to make this a solid, entertaining source of Commodore matters:
