Making Music Stick...

Memorization Giving You Trouble? Here are some strategies for memorizing your music. Whether it is a busy work/life balance or an occasional "what did I do with my keys" or just predictable "gettin' older," memorizing music can be a challenge. Not to worry! Here are a few practical strategies to use along with a dose of patience and you will be able to commit your music to memory.

1. Break It Down

Don't tackle the whole song at once! Start small:

- Focus on one section (like the intro or a tricky tag).
- Once mastered, move to the next. Think of it as building a musical puzzle, one piece at a time.

2. Repetition with a Twist

Repetition is key, but mix it up to keep your brain engaged:

- Sing along with your learning tracks in the car or while doing chores around the house.
- · Hum your part when getting ready in the morning.
- Whisper the lyrics as a bedtime routine—it's like counting sheep but with harmony!

3. Write It Out

Studies show writing helps with memory. Try this:

- · Write the lyrics by hand without looking.
- Then check your work and fill in the gaps.

4. Use Visual Anchors

Some of us are visual learners.

- Picture the lyrics as images or associate them with a scene.
- Example: "Down by the old mill stream" could be paired with an image of a serene riverbank.

5. Sing in Slow Motion

Practice singing the song *super slowly*. This reinforces accuracy and lets you savor every note and word. Gradually increase the tempo as it becomes second nature.

6. Get Physical

Incorporating movement can help lock in the memory.

- Use gestures or subtle choreography that align with the lyrics. (these can be planned or created by you)
- Walk in rhythm with the song while practicing to add a kinesthetic element.

7. Revisit Often

Even after you've memorized the song, revisit it regularly to keep it fresh.

- Quick daily run-throughs can reinforce your recall. Our songs are usually less than 3 mins—easy to fit into your day.
- Don't let "performance mode" sneak in too soon—focus on truly mastering the music.

8. Be Kind to Yourself

Our brains are like muscles—they get stronger with practice. Don't stress if it takes time to memorize a song. Celebrate small victories, like getting through a tough passage or remembering a lyric you always mix up.

9. Lean on Your Learning Tracks

Barbershop learning tracks are your best friends. Listen passively while driving, cooking, or relaxing—it helps build familiarity without feeling like extra work.

Remember: You're not just memorizing notes and words—you're telling a story, creating emotion, and sharing joy. The more connected you feel to the music, the easier it will be to commit it to memory.


Markin' Time



Chapter anniversaries


Four score and 1,568 members ago...

No Frosty While Driving



Sometimes it is the editor's role to inform when something of interest crosses the desk. While some might see the following as worthy of publication, others might characterize it as something that was unearthed from a bottomless grab bag of useless information, however on we go. Following a little analyzin', recognizin', itemizin', summarizin', and realizin' (notice I didn't say antagonizin' although that judgement remains in your purview), I present what I view to be some interesting, and possible life-saving information from an article that was published prior to the recent holidays.

Some research from the South China University of Technology indicates that songs with 120 or more Beats Per Minute (BPM) have psychological and cardiovascular effects that increase the likelihood that a motorist, while underway listening to music, will engage in dangerous driving habits which can lead to an increased risk of a crash.

The researchers concluded that drivers listening to light music, about 80 BPM or fewer, changed lanes about 70 times an hour, while those listening to rock music (the "vehicle" for study used here) made up to 140 lane changes an hour. The "rock drivers" also drove between 5 and 10 miles per hour faster on average. Motorists listening to music with 120 BPM or more were associated with an increased risk of an accident.

So what does this have to do with me and the holidays you might ask. An organization identified Christmas songs as the most dangerous to listen to while driving. The worst song of them all (not Rudolph) turned out to be "Frosty the Snowman". It's 172 BPM and "thump, thump" lyrics make this a high risk for drivers. The second most dangerous song, with 150 BPM, is Mariah Carey's, "All I Want for Christmas is You". "Santa Claus is Comin' to Town", "Let it Snow, Let it Snow", and several other holiday songs also start edging into the danger zone.

Consider yourself warned and rest assured that you now have quite a few months to prepare yourself for a "No Frosty Driving Christmas" in 2025. You may want to look at some of your favorite Barbershop up-tunes and see if they should be given a PG-17 driving rating as well (I'm looking at you Freddie Mercury with "Don't Stop Me Now").
