Door prizes, gift certificates to Bachmans, were given away and the lucky winners were **Debbie Mason, Rosie Glover**, and **Karen Wentworth**.




To the Commodores,

Director's Corner With Jamye Casperson



Harmony in Leadership: The Many Faces of Leadership in the Commodores By Jamye Casperson

The Minneapolis Commodores has a strong group of visible leaders in our chorus. These include the directors, president, VP of (fill in the blank...technology, music/performance, marketing, etc.), section leaders and our board members.

However, not every leader has a title. Here's a look at some of the ways I see people being a leader in the Commodores every single rehearsal.

The Encourager: The Heartbeat

Some lead by lifting others up—a word of encouragement to a nervous newcomer, a shared laugh during a break, or a thoughtful message after a performance. These informal leaders are the glue that keeps the choir family strong and welcoming.

The Quartet: The Courageous

It takes guts to step forward and sing alone, and guys that sing in quartets embody bravery and trust. Their willingness to sing their part alone inspires others to stretch their own comfort zones. They lead by example, showing what's possible when we take a risk.

The Newcomer: The Fresh Perspective

Even brand-new members can lead in their own way. With their fresh eyes and ears, they bring energy, ask important questions, and often remind the group of the joy of singing together. Their enthusiasm is contagious and vital to keeping the choir vibrant.

The Listener Leader

These members may not always speak up first, but they lead by example through careful listening both musically and interpersonally.

The Confident Performer

These are the people who light up in front of an audience. Their stage presence and vocal confidence inspire others to project more boldly. They're often the ones others watch for cues when uncertain, simply because of their enthusiasm in delivery.

The Empath

These choir members have a sixth sense for how others are feeling. They know when someone's having a rough day, offer a supportive word, and foster an emotionally safe environment. They create a sense of belonging and care in the group.

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The Knowledge Sharer

Maybe they've sung in choirs for years or have a strong barbershop background—they're generous with tips, pronunciation help, or explanations of musical terms. They lead through mentorship, always happy to help others grow without making anyone feel small.

The Morale Booster

Some people just lift the room. They bring the laughs and/or organize post-rehearsal hangouts. These members lead through positivity and connection, making the choir a place people genuinely love to come to week after week.

The Problem Solver

These members have a knack for finding solutions. They're often practical thinkers who lead in quiet, effective ways that keep things moving forward.

The Reliable Rock

Always prepared, always present, always steady—this type of leader may not be flashy, but their dependability is reassuring. They anchor the group with consistency and dedication, setting a high standard just by being themselves.

The Bridge Builder

Sometimes choirs have natural cliques—section-based or social—and it takes someone with strong interpersonal instincts to connect the dots. These members make sure no one feels left out which strengthens the whole ensemble.

In the Commodores, leadership is often informal but incredibly powerful.

It shows up in kindness, encouragement and lending a helping hand whenever needed. I encourage each and every one of you to find the best way for you to be a leader in our group. Everyone brings something unique to the group—and that diversity of strengths is what makes Commodores a truly special singing community. Let's celebrate the many leaders among us and keep making great music together!



- From the March 1977 CHORD-INATOR: Had an announcement for annual auditions. The auditions on March 22 to be held at Southdale Center. A short program with the chorus and quartets to be presented to the public in the Garden Court with auditions to follow. The announcement goes on to say that each member is expected to have at least two new prospects to attend the show and then be auditioned. (The April issue stated that 22 men would become new Commodores after the audition.)
- From the May, 1977 Chordinator: Thirteen new members were welcomed into the Commodores in the last month, eleven from the auditions in March. Some names familiar to older members are:
 - o Chuck Dostal 1995 BOTY
 - Vern Halverson Two of his sons eventually joined the Commodores. Jim was the Commodore's director for a little less than two years. Both Larry and Jim would be in District Champion Quartets, both in the Land O' Lakes District and in the Far West District after they moved out of state.
 - Fritz Hering In later years his claim to fame would be getting into the Minneapolis newspaper (complete with picture) for trying to deliver a singing telegram to a Minneapolis City Hall staff person in a cowboy outfit complete with toy pistols. The metal detectors did not like his pistols. (Some suspected that Fritz tipped the paper of an attempted breach of security)
 - **Rudy Stenson** stood on the risers for entire meetings while he was well into his 90's.
 - Greg Volk Was a junior at Hopkins High School when he joined making him the youngest Commodore. He played bass (both string and electric), guitar, piano, banjo, and harmonica. Later became the baritone with the Excalibur Quartet, seven-time international top ten quartet finalist. Many of the songs Excalibur sang were arranged by him.

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"The American classic tune of 'It Had To Be You' is a mainstay among vocalists, and it's definitely a favorite of mine. It was originally arranged by Isham Jones with lyrics penned by frequent collaborator Gus Kahn in 1924. Around that time, the pair were known for popular dance hits, like 'Swingin' Down the Lane,' 'Spain,' 'I'll See You In My Dreams,' and 'The One I Love (Belongs to Somebody Else)'. One of the tune's first recordings featured jazz vocalist Marion Harris. A couple of months after its release, the song became a No. 1 hit, featured in innumerable films, including Casablanca, Annie Hall, and When Harry Met Sally. To this day, it has yet to waltz out of our hearts. But for right now, it's become this tag! Feel free to put your swingin' shoes on, but take it real easy; it's not meant to be fast in any way. This should be a very comfortable range for all the parts, especially nice and warm for the basses. It follows a classic ii-V-I progression with a 'swoon-worthy' diddly trio over a bass hanger at the end. The 'had-to-be' unison part needs to be blended, not blasted--think: less is more! Tagmeister Richards could probably have told you the physics of why that works better for unison phrases, especially in chorus settings, and it sets up nicely for the final couple measures. Each 'you' chord goes in succession from a juicy C-minor-6, to a tasteful F7, then home to Bb. Enjoy!"

Want to navigate videos like a pro? These keyboard shortcuts will change your YouTube life:

- Spacebar: Pause/Play
- Arrow Keys (Left/Right): Move forward or backward 5 seconds.
- J/L: Move backward or forward 10 seconds.
- K: Pause/Play (same as spacebar)
- F: Enter/Exit fullscreen mode.
- M: Mute/Unmute
- Up/Down Arrow Keys: Adjust volume.
- 0 (zero): Jump to the beginning of the video.
- End: Jump to the end of the video.
- Number Keys (1-9): Jump to a specific percentage of the video (e.g., 5 jumps to 50%).

Pro Tip: Check out the "Library" tab on your YouTube channel to see all your playlists in one place.



Bill Albrecht's Craft Corner

Bill Albrecht, an accomplished Barbershop director, has graciously started to share some of his knowledge during our Tuesday rehearsals. Shown below is a Circle of Vowels that can be used to practice using the correct vowel sound.



*Start with "ee" and go clockwise around the outside of the circle.
*Minimize your jaw movement.
*Notice the jaw is lowest at "ah."
*Generally, keep the tip of your tongue against the lower gum ridge.
*Generally, keep your "blades up." The sides of your tongue should touch the bottom of your back upper molars. You can accomplish this by saying the word "yay."
