The* sense of community is also strengthened through the rhythm of chatting with each other, catching up during break times."

I'm excited that we continue to gather, to stretch and to grow as a chorus. I fully anticipate that 2024

will be one of the most important and enhancing years in our 80 year history. And I hope we will all recruit and embrace new members and welcome new opportunities like MCX with open arms.
