Here's a nice **Billy Joel** tag for the warming spring/summer days coming up to aid in the travel-lust that usually comes with. The song was written in 1977 and is widely regarded as one of his signature songs. It features a piano-driven melody and introspective lyrics that speak to the idea that life moves quickly and that youth and innocence are fleeting. Joel sings about the importance of appreciating life's beauty in simple moments, such as "waiting for the rain to fall." The song's title, "Vienna," is used as a meta-phor for the elegance and sophistication one can find in the simpler things in life. It is becoming quite a sensation on social media platforms like TikTok, and its newfound popularity with the younger generation is attributed to various reasons. One factor is the song's catchy melody and nostalgic feel, making

it appealing to a new generation of listeners. The melody gives off a nice 'bluesy' feel with the Cb-Bb smears on 'realize' and 'Vienna'. In the tune, this line usually uses a flat-6 on 'realize', a snazzy variation for the 2-5-1 chord progression. This tag sticks with a basic 2, or a Bb7 chord. The basses and baris share their moment at the end, a partial homage to the Heart of My Heart polecat because of course... why not? If you so desire, you might even input your favorite city or place or hometown you dream of, not just Vienna, i.e. When will you realize, Twin Cities waits for you?

(This is the remaining portion of **Cerutti's** class from Leadership Academy session last January. Although opinions expressed are his, they certainly are worthy of a robust discussion at a minimum.)

1. 200,000 people are singing barbershop today that do not belong to a sanctioned barbershop chapter. (source: Hal Leonard Publishers, tracking sheet music sales.)

2. Membership drives and ticket sales are antiquated ways to sustain a chapter.

3. BHS hasn't done anything different for the last 30-40 years except maybe learning tracks.

4. Guest nights are antiquated ways of serving the public.

5. The Brigade weekends, with free concerts, would fit the Outreach concept, if it was more than once a year in any community.

6. Singing valentines should be free for anyone in your community.

7. Good marketing / PR is not necessarily considered Outreach as it has expectations of more income.

### **Benefits for Chapters from Outreach**

1. Singing activities will create awareness by providing assistance to worthy causes in a community.

2. Develops a symbiotic connection with a cause or a community it serves.

3. Gets a chapter more directly connected to a particular cause.

4. Help with chorus retention with a diverse array of performance opportunities.

5. Six steps for a chapter to get started:

a. Identify our expectations and determine if we are ready for this

- b. Access community opportunities
- c. Initiate collaborations
- d. Form long-lasting partnerships
- e. Stay focused
- f. Tell your story

Cerutti suggested a novel way for this to be implemented. First it would involve 3 rehearsals a week, and a fourth one doing a concert in the community. This could be followed by an afterglow with the members of that community event. One on one with them would really build a lasting trust.

We all know of opportunities to help out our neighbors. They are unlimited and all that is required is our commitment to offer our services to the people who have so many needs.
