The Fox Cities Performing Arts Center in Appleton, Wisconsin, with its capacious stage, crystal-clear sound, and its other amenities, was the perfect venue for the 2016 LOL District Barbershop Convention and Contests.

However, what made this year's conclave so special for the Minneapolis chapter was the induction of our director, **Paul Wigley**, into the LOL District's *Hall of Fame*. He has been a Godsend to the Commodores with his appeal to young singers and his all-inclusive

Moving on, the competition began Friday evening with the quartet semifinals where twenty-one foursomes battled to attain one of the top-ten places in the Saturday-evening finals.

After the smoke cleared, the odds-on favorites, *Ruckus* and *Underground*, were among the final ten. *Swype*, representing the Commodores, had finished eighteenth with consistent scores varying by only one or two points per category, missing sixteenth by only three points.

When the final scores were tallied the *Great Northern Union Chorus* had amassed a winning 87.8 percent score with a package approaching technical perfec-

tion but concluding with a selection that involved a circuslike motif that made it difficult for this audience member to appreciate its music.

Midwest Vocal Express from Greendale, Wisconsin, performed quite well at 80.8 percent but is on the bubble for a wild-card invitation to the 2017 Las Vegas Convention. In third place with 74.9 percent were the Commodores, seemingly entrapped in the High-B level with that coveted A-Level always beyond our grasp. We were consoled somewhat by edging Fargo by two points. (I'm sure there was a firestorm in heaven or somewhere, when **Ed Peterka** heard the results.)

Barbershop caught his ear in college and later, with friends in Milwaukee, he sang with Midwest Vocal Express.


Learning photography and computer programing take up some of his free time and he also enjoys working out, swimming, triathlons, Frisbee Golf, and learning about new technology.

# What WAS all this Category Specialist stuff?

Most of you know that for the past

three years I have been filling a position known as Music Category Specialist. Because I am very near the end of that term, I just want to share with the Commodore family some of the *inside track* on

what a Category Specialist really does.

First of all, before becoming Category Specialist (CS), a person serves on the Music Board of Review. I have served on that committee many years previously, and it basically functions to review the judging competency of every certified judge. (To those of you that constantly complain about judges, there actually IS a very intense review process to ensure that judges are not incompetent idiots!) The Category Specialist has to be approved by the BHS CEO, and then must consent to a three-year term. I

was very fortunate to have a great friend, **Jimbob Kahlke**, precede me as Music CS. His helpful guidance took a lot of stress out of the job for me in the early months.

My term has included duties such as: making all judging assignments for the Music Category, for all districts in the BHS; reviewing concerns/ complaints about judges behavior and evaluation effectiveness; mentoring candidate judges as they move through the process of becoming certified; reviewing and editing the Music Category Description and makeing changes that indicate the evolution of our Barbershop rules; coordinating and leading Category School curriculum (which occurs once every three years); and participating in the Society Contest and Judging Committee, that guides all rules and regulations about every Barbershop contest throughout the world.

The biggest duty as CS (especially in the Music Category) was to guide the evolution of what is, or is not, contestable Barbershop music. As you all know, our contest songs have become much more creative, and have much greater variety, than they did a decade ago. The years of hear-

ing a few *safe* songs, sung over and over again, are hopefully over! Our International Quartet and Chorus Contests now showcase tremendous imagination, with very little mundane repetition. I think that is a very good thing for the Barbershop Harmony Society, and the music world in general.

This entire CS term has been a fascinating (and sometimes extremely busy!) ride. While I've enjoyed it all, I'm ready to hand it off to a successor!

(Wow! It's sure great to just be a Commodore!)



# Georgia Grind

What causes a train to leave the

tracks, tracks that have been used time and again, that always lead to the same ending? Except that sometimes the train gets up too much steam and


speeds beyond the red line or experiences some other event causing it to go awry. Maybe it's just the crew, becoming distracted, bored, or overly excited, operating the train in an unusual fashion.

Well, perhaps that is what the Commodores experienced at the recent contest. The "tracks" of the songs we performed were laid out and maintained properly, the route was a familiar one, the singers seemed to be alert and ready to repeat what they had done so many times before and all pointed toward what would be a very successful trip. In fact, the first half of it seemed to be pretty much what the directors excitedly anticipated. But, the second half (i.e. the second song) seemed to go awry for no discernable reason.

Each section seemed to sing what they had been singing, the dynamics appeared to be there, some of the finer points were addressed, and all of the other elements were covered, or so it seemed. And with so many veterans in the chorus, there was a level of experience that could glue a performance together. Yet, when the performance was over, I had that oft-present, nagging feeling that the train had left the tracks. What I felt was that we had performed just as we had lead-

ing up to the contest, but somehow there was a dismaying sense that we had somehow blown it in the overall performance—just a very unsettled feeling and hard to tell exactly upon what to pin it.

Oh, the judges had all of their critiques ready and suggestions as to where we might have improved. And they put into words what everyone had felt when we had failed to sync and put our contest-best-foot forward. In a couple of contests in the past, I have written that judges giving us errant and "rogue" scores which fell way out of line with the other judge's scores, really hurt our



standings and that there should be a fairer way to compile the many scores. Since then, the process seems to have been improved a bit and judge training has perhaps addressed this less formally.

In any case, I think the judges provided fair scores for how we performed this time and we could wish for a chance to show them that we really can perform at a higher level. We just didn't do it at this contest. We can, we just didn't!

Some likened it to the recent Viking game where the players seemed to do everything just plain wrong or poorly, just a forgettable performance. But hey, I'd rather liken it to the game be-

tween the Vikings and Green Bay Packers earlier this fall. No matter what the Packers tried, they just didn't perform well and lost decisively even though they had performed competitively against the Vikings in previous games. OK, maybe that isn't the best analogy and maybe it offends some of the more sensitive of those cheering for the team to the east. Point is, sometimes you put forth the effort and you are rewarded beyond your desires. Other times, not so much.

So what do we do? Be pleased that the scoring this time seemed to reflect how we did; we must pick up the pieces and move forward. We do have the personnel, coaching, directing and all the rest. We just have to execute better from now on. Not to single out the basses, but they apparently need some speech therapy to overcome the "tongue tangley" kind of thing. The judge seemed to try to describe that condition but even (I heard it second hand.) he seemed to have difficulty conveying what that means in the overly-short ten minutes of critique.

It was only compounded by our esteemed judge and director, **Paul Wigley**, when he attempted to remember what the "tongue term" actually was and why and how the basses should avoid it while vocalizing. If ever there was a blank expression, it was on the basses' faces as they fought to comprehend what they had just been told. Who could blame them? Or Paul?



Next August Jim Clark will be bringing his quartet, the 2009 International Champions, Storm Front, to the Open. They will be on the links and will be entertaining the attendees after the dinner.

The Open can accommodate 144 golfers so make your plans early and perhaps have a chance to partner with a member of Storm Front or one of the other local Barbershop celebrities. Log on to **bhsopen.com**.
