On this past August 8 (and for the ninth consecutive year), a group of Twin Cities Area Barbershoppers sponsored the Annual Barbershop Open at the Elk River Golf Club in Elk River, Minnesota. The group known as *The Friday Lunch Bunch That Meets On Thursday* (TFLBTMOT) is made up of members from the Twin Cities-area Chapters of the Barbershop Harmony Society. One of its more recent endeavors is to raise funds for the Youth-In-Harmony young-men's chorus program sponsored by Society's affiliate, *Harmony Foundation*. Jim Clark, lead-singer of the International champions, *Storm Front*, representing Harmony Foundation, participated in this year's Open and after dinner gave us an update on the objective of our fund-raising efforts. In this program entitled *Youth Festival*, young men's choruses come from around the world to compete at the Society's annual Midwinter Convention. From modest beginnings, over the last few years, the program has grown near-exponentially until in Reno last January, 16 youth-choruses, with a total of 343 participants, performed. The *Diocesan Boys School Choir* alone brought 56 singers from Hong

Kong and, incidentally, earned a superior rating.

TFLBTMOT has pledged \$10,000 this year to the *Youth Festival* and we are pleased to announce that with the \$7500 raised in this year's open along with funds raised at the weekly luncheons (in attempts to stifle Dan Cole's weekly Minneapolis-chapter reports), TFLBTMOT has met its goal. These monies will go to defray the expenses of one youth chorus at the San Antonio Midwinter Convention next January.

The golf tournament next year will again be held at the Elk River Club on August 7, 2017, our tournament's 10^{th} anniversary. We encourage men's, women's and mixed teams. Registration, including golf, cart, prizes, free range-balls and a buffet, is \$100/per person. We also solicit Hole Sponsorships, ranging from \$100 and up. This is a non-profit event with all proceeds going to the *Harmony Foundation*.

A special event for the 2017 Open is being planned and we will be limiting our golfers to the first 144 players. Jim Clark, and *Storm Front* will be participating in next year's Open and will be performing at <u>"The 19th Hole Party"</u> which non-golfers may also want to attend.

His passion and dedication deserve to be celebrated in such a way as to attempt to match and honor the scope of the impact he had on each of our lives.

This is a big challenge, but so was our Lunch Bunch effort to raise \$10,000 to sponsor a youth chorus next January in San Antonio. As of last week, that \$10,000 is in the bank at Harmony Foundation for support of a youth chorus for the 2017 San Antonio Midwinter Convention.

Attending our luncheon this day was Jim Clark, Harmony Foundation Regional Director and lead of Storm Front. He has been our guide in this effort and has pledged Harmony Foundation's help to make our dream a reality through fundraising visits in LOL, media blasts and updates, and helping promote the TFLBTMOT funding efforts, particularly the BHS Open in 2017. Storm Front will be playing in next year's Golf Tournament and will provide entertainment at the after-Open meal.

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2016 NUT-SALES KICK-OFF

Labor Day Weekend has come and

gone and so has the traditional summer season. Labor Day is a time that we associate with certain yearly activities in our lives stopping or slowing down and other things beginning again. Things that stop or slow

down are our annual summer vacations, trips to the cabin or the lake, time at the local beach, and summer recreational programs. Things that begin again are school for the kids, football, a renewal of church activities, and a definite shorting of the daylight hours.

There is one other thing that is certain to start on the day after Labor Day and that is the Annual Commodores Nut Sales Campaign. For those new to the Commodores the Nut Sales are one of our major funding sources contributing \$11,300 to our treasury last year.

The premise is simple. Members take orders for one pound bags of nuts to be delivered at a later date. When orders are complete the appropriate amount of bulk nuts are ordered and the bulk nuts are broken down into one-pound bags. The nuts are then distributed to the member salesman to deliver to the customers. Since this is a "wholesale product in / retail prod-

live in Chanhassen. A native of Grand Rapids, Michigan, after high school he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in electrical engineering at the University of Illi-

nois. He lists his occupation as marketing and is self-employed with his uct out" operation the Commodores take the profits on the sales.

The Commodores have been doing an annual nut sales drive as a fund raiser for many years (I have some old Nut Order Forms that date to 1983, and I don't know if there was a Nut Sales Drive prior to that). Over those many years the nut sales effort has contributed significantly to the Commodores treasury. During my tenure as Nut Administrator, which dates to 2006, the Nut Sales Drive has contributed a total of \$97,750 to the Commodores treasury (an average of \$9,775 per year).

With the potential of that kind of cash enhancement to the Commodores' treasury, every member should be working at selling these nuts. For those new to the program, these are top quality nuts from a Minnesota supplier. Usually they are less than two weeks from the roaster to the customer, a claim that the top-tier grocery and specialty stores cannot match.

Our customers rave about the quality of our product, and our prices are at least competitive with the fancy stores (and in fact, are lower on some items). Our customers are friends and relatives of Commodores members. Some members sell to neighbors, work mates, spouse work mates, or friends from their church. I've heard of orders from members' banks, dentist office, barbershop, or insurance office. A lot of these orders get bigger every year because these nuts are so delicious.

own company, Enviro-Control.

For 45 years Steve has been a singer, in choral groups, a cappella ensembles, and church choirs. Attracted to Barbershopping in high school and through college, over the years he has been a member of three different Barbershop chapters, each of which he competed with Internationally. Also along the way, Steve has performed in many school productions and some community theater

Just like last year the nuts will be in heavy-duty heat-sealed plastic bags with professional looking labels. We also offer foil gift bags with the Commodores information on the back and a greeting label on the front complete with a "From" and "To" for gift giving. The cost for the foil bag is \$1.50.

We also have a relationship with several businesses that order a quantity of nuts in the foil bag as a holiday favor to their vendors or even their employees. For business customers we offer custom labels on the front side of the bag with the business name and logo to promote their business. If you think a business you deal with might like this as a favor for their vendors or customers please promote this to them. The additional cost is still only \$1.50 for the foil bag.

You can begin selling immediately and be sure to collect the money when the order is taken. No nuts are stockpiled and only the nuts paid for are ordered. Our vendor makes only one delivery and we receive an extra 2% discount for payment within 10 days of delivery. Thus, it is essential to collect the money when making the sale.

Most of our customers look forward to our nut sales every year. They like the very high quality of the product we sell and, of course, many like to support the Commodores. The deadline for Thanksgiving delivery is at the meeting on Tuesday, October 25. Please start selling immediately.

A look back at the 1962 Commodore show

I recently came across the Memoran-



dum of Agreement between the Regents of the University of Minnesota and the Minneapolis Chapter of SPEBSQSA pertaining to the February 10. 1962, annual Pa-

rade of Quartets to be held at Northrop Auditorium on the U of M campus. The agreement was signed on behalf of our chapter by two iconic Commodores, **Ed Peterka** as 1961 chapter president, and **Bruce Church**ill as 1962 Show Chairman. A few items of the agreement caught my attention from a historical perspective.

Tickets were to be priced at \$3.50, \$3.00, \$2.50, and \$1.50. Were all tickets to be sold the gross income from ticket sales would have been \$13,807. (I expect almost all were sold as was the case for several shows during our Northrop-as-a-venue years). Show expenses were projected at \$3,300 including advertising costs of \$900 in such publications as the *Minneapolis Star & Tribune*, the *St. Paul Pioneer Dispatch & Press*, *The Minnesota Daily, Jewish World, Symphony*, and *Visitor*. (We obviously cast a wide advertising net in those days).

Show proceeds were to be divided as follows: (1) Presentation expenses, not to exceed \$3,250 were to be paid first; (2) The next \$500 of receipts were to be donated to the Variety Club Heart Hospital Special Equipment Fund [established by the Commodores]; (3) The next \$2,750 were to be paid to the Minneapolis Chapter; (4) Ticket sales in excess of \$6,500 were to be divided with 42.5% being awarded to the Minneapolis Chapter and 57.5% to the Variety Club Heart Hospital Special Equipment Fund. It is interesting to note in this regard that according to the 1962 annual show program a total of more than \$60,000 had been donated from receipts from previous shows.

The Memorandum of Agreement also included the estimate that 287 passes would be distributed. A partial list of projected recipients (and the estimated number of passes they would be awarded) included: (1) eight to music critics; (2) 28 to the University's Concerts and Lectures Department; (3) 16 to the University President and Minnesota Governor; (4) 44 to the Parade Chairman; (5) 50 to special contributors; and (6) 85 to the chapter (chorus members involved in the show perhaps?)

A glance at the 1962 show program reveals that Bruce Churchill's show theme was "Stadium Harmony" which honored the Minnesota Vikings, Twins, and Gophers. Local quartets performing on the show included the *Southridge Jubilaires*, the *Mel-O-Dons*, the *Hut Four*, and the Atomic Bums. Visiting quartets were the *Gay Nineties*, and soon-to-be International Champions, the *Four Renegades*, and the *Town and Country Four*. The Commodore Chorus sang under the direction of **Harold Ulring**.

The show program also included a proclamation from Minneapolis Mayor, Arthur Naftalin, in which he proclaimed February 5-10, 1962 as "Harmony Week" and urged every citizen of the community to rededicate himself (sic) to a new spirit of friendship and harmony with his neighbor.

Re-examining the Memorandum of Agreement and the 1962 Show Program reminded me of what a big deal our annual show was in the early 1960s. I think that Northrop Auditorium held about 4600 seats and we came very close to selling out our single 8:00 show on more than a few occasions. Ah.....those were the glory days of our beloved Barbershop hobby.

An end of summer bonus by the Curmudgeon-at-Large

My goal in recent months has been to fill up the recycle can before it is picked up every other week. As a result, I've spent a fair amount of time re-examining my treasure trove of Barbershop memorabilia. A few weeks ago I came across a piece of sheet music that grabbed my attention. Closer examination revealed it to be an original song (both music and lyrics) by Randine Hatlestad, wife and mother, respectively, of late ex-Commodores, Jerry and Wes Hatlestad. The song was titled *We are Your Own Sweet Adelines* and carried a Notary Public's stamp and signature dated October 21, 1952.

I have no idea how I came into possession of this rare gem and my immediate regret upon discovering it was that I didn't find it in time to pass it on to Wes, who would have loved it and doubtless added it to his solo repertoire for special occasions. A glance at the lyrics quickly conveyed to me that the song was almost assuredly composed in recognition and celebration of the chartering of the City of Lakes Sweet Adelines Chapter in April 1952, which signaled to all that the women of the Twin Cities area were about to share with their male counterparts the love of Barbershop.

Randine was the first musical director of what was first named the Minnesota No. 1 Chapter of Sweet Adelines, but was re-named the City of Lakes Chapter just a year later. Since discovering this piece of music I've been trying without success to find anybody who remembers singing it or has any familiarity with it. I've passed a copy of the music on to Caryl Hansen (wife of John) and Abbie Rye (an acquaintance of Dale Lynch), both of whom were charter members of the chorus. Neither recalls the song or has any recollection of singing it.

Another story. (I have taken some liberty with this, but have tried to stay faithful to the gist of the facts.) At a rehearsal or two ago, **Rod Vink** tapped me on the shoulder and related that when he read my last article it brought him right back to a quartet singout some time ago. I had written about dementia and how, among other things, it destroys memories, and then, how important and lasting is the musical connec-



tion to the mind.

As many of us have done, Rod and his quartet were performing for a group of nursing home residents by singing a variety of songs. Upon finishing, the staff was giving the parting thanks and appreciation when one of them mentioned that there was a group of residents who were unable, for various reasons, to join the audience where the quartet had performed. "Would you be willing to stay a little longer and sing for them?", she asked. No Barbershopper ever says "No!," to being asked to sing just a few more songs. Nor did this quartet. So they headed down the hall to another, smaller room.

In it were just a few residents, all in wheelchairs and for the most part, unresponsive. Two or three were facing the wall without any apparent complaint.

This was going to be tough, not because of an audience whose minds were in another world, but rather because of the realization of what these residents had lost, the memories, their families, and all the moments once precious to them. Tough! Tough! Tough! But, as is true of most Barbershoppers, the quartet was there to perform. No matter what they felt inside, the performing commandment mandates setting personal feelings aside and mustering a performing persona ... and so they did.

After a number or two in the little room with no detectable recognition by the audience of what was going on, the foursome noticed one resident whose nurse had turned him away from the wall aiming him toward the quartet. The move didn't seem to make a difference as the expressionless face remained blank.

Rod announced the next song, *This* Little *Light Of Mine*, and the quartet resumed singing. In a few moments, the nurse realized this resident's lips were beginning to move in time with the song. Leaning closer, she began to hear the words the resident was saying. AND singing. "This little light of mine, I'm goin' to let it shine." The nurse uttered a quiet gasp and the quartet immediately noticed. (Personally, I'm surprised they could continue.)

Reaching a dramatic ending, there was no applause, except for that of a nurse or two perhaps. It was then that the nurse attending the singing resident faced him and said, "George, I didn't know you could sing. Where did you learn that song?" Barely changing his expression, he said, "My mother taught it to me when I was just a little boy." Astounded, the nurse could scarcely speak. With a quivering voice and moving close to the quartet she said, "George has not spoken one word for the two years I've been taking care of him. And Go to Grind, Page 10,

now he spoke and he sang the words right along with you. That is a wonder!"

I believe George returned to his other world when the quartet departed. I can only hope, though, that the musical connection that brought about this glimmer of his mother and what she had taught him so long ago, made for some other warm memories. Maybe a song or two in his future would do the same again.

Thanks, Rod, for sharing t his story. It's great fun to write an article and then be able to enhance it later by adding another's personal experience. I think most of us will never begin to comprehend the impact we have on the world by sharing our singing talents with others. But as in the above story, in big ways and some very small ways, we can make a joyful difference. Sing on, Barbershoppers! Sing on!

And with the therapeutic benefits of

singing, you can keep some balance in your life! So, sing with a spirited group of Barbershoppers-men like the Minneapolis Commodores. If you are already a Commodore, make, and act on, that Barbershopper Bucket List. Some have told me about doing so to their great excitement and satisfaction!

Don't forget to hold fast to that which is good, and trust me, the research on the origins of the Georgia Grind continues unabated.
